REMEMBERING BOB COOK



TREAT YOUR ASH TREES OR LOSE THEM

Elverson Tree Commission

We, as members of your Elverson Shade Tree Commission, have taken steps to deal with the imminent danger to ash trees from the insect known as Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). This invasive insect has been detected in 55 of Pennsylvania's 67 counties and is moving eastward. Its detection is anticipated in Lancaster and Chester counties this summer.

The Borough Council has approved our request to begin treatment of the Borough's street ash trees beginning in 2015. The recommended schedule is to treat every other year over the

next ten years. We will soon finalize a contract with a credentialed arborist to treat the 27 ash trees along South Pine Street.

There are other ash trees within the Borough on private property that will fall victim to EAB unless treated. These ash trees may be added to the Borough's treatment schedule at the Borough's cost rate and time

frame. Homeowners choosing to have their ash trees treated are responsible for the cost of treatment and will be billed directly by the arborist.

If you, as a homeowner, have ash trees on your property and would like to include them in the treatment this May, please contact a Tree Commission member listed below by April 15.

How To Get the Most From Your Insurance Policies

Insurance has roots back to the Babylonians of 17th century BC. Merchant shippers would pay a little extra to their lenders in order to be in

the clear if their goods were lost at sea. This practice continued and remained within the maritime tradition until the London fire of 1666. Most of our modern insurance processes come from the first offices open in Britain and the coffee house Edward Lloyd ran his new venture (Lloyd's of London). But what does this mean to you?

After the devastating Fire of 1666 in London the people realized the need to protect their most important assets. Whether that is your home, merchant goods, your income, or most importantly your value to your family. It's been almost 350 years since then, but the tradition remains; people still wish to protect their assets and use insurance to do so.

In recent years many insurance companies have tried to commoditize a financial product that is not meant to be shaped one size fits all. Each state has a minimum amount of insurance you must carry on your vehicle, but in PA it does not amount to much, \$15,000 per person and \$30,000 per accident to pay for any Bodily Injury Liability that arises from an at-fault accident. When a ride to the hospital can cost \$1000 or more, that money is quickly washed away. Now for a young person with no assets and a cheap car, that policy makes sense. For a 40+ year old with a house, family, retirement fund, etc., they have much more to protect, and should. A good insurance advisor will review your current coverage, make suggestions and work within your budget to protect your assets. For some, their home is one of their most important assets.

Homeowners Insurance is required by mortgage companies, mostly paid by escrow, and not really thought about except maybe once a year at renewal or unless something goes wrong. When you have a claim is not the time to find out what your policy covers and if you have adequate coverage. A must for every homeowner is replacement cost versus actual cash value. ACV means your 10 year old roof will be depreciated for 10 years and you'll only get 60-50-maybe even 30% its value to replace if you have a claim. Also, homeowners should have a broad form policy that provides coverage for anything that is not specifically excluded (such as floods, earthquakes, war, etc). If it's been a while since you reviewed your insurance policies give your company a call to schedule a review. If they are confused by this notion it may be time to find a new insurance agent.

MUNICIPAL AUTHORITY OF THE BOROUGH OF ELVERSON ADOPTED RATE INCREASE

To Our Customers:

After careful review, the Municipal Authority Board has authorized a rate increase to be effective for the 1st Quarter of 2015 (Jan, Feb, and Mar). The rate will increase from \$189.00 per Quarter (\$756.00 per year) to \$192.00 per Quarter (\$768.00 per year). Reservation Fees will remain at \$69.00 per Quarter (\$276.00 per year).

This increase is due to the ever-rising costs for operations and engineering support to operate our treatment plant and support our rate payers. We continually strive for cost savings and avoidance measures to keep these increases to a minimum.

Proper operation of the Wastewater Treatment Plant remains the top priority. Customer payments support the service that is provided to you as a homeowner and is also an investment in maintaining our sewer system. No customers connected to the sewer system are exempt from payment. Thankfully, the majority of our customers pay in a timely manner and we appreciate that.

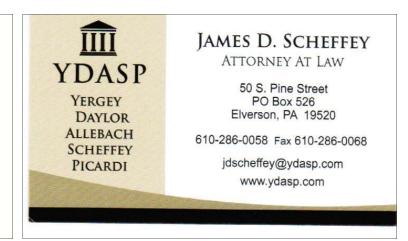
