he Farmers' Market at Elverson has existed for four years. It was inspired by Bob Patry, encouraged by Esther Prosser, and initially managed by Evan Miller. For the last three years the Gables and I have managed the market. This experience has been immeasurable. Not only have all of our businesses expanded but the relationships built with each other as vendors and community members have enriched our lives.

The setting at Livingood Park has been beautiful and a great venue for community interaction. The market has provided a great place for start-ups to decide whether or not they want to continue in business as well as an avenue for businesses to become more organized and efficient. It has provided a place for crafters to sell things such as handbags made by women from Africa who use the proceeds to sustain their family, or succulent plants from three energetic women in the area also trying to feed their families.

Volunteers from the PA Woodland Stewardship program have used this market to educate local homeowners on how to care for their forests. Children have enjoyed coming to the market with their family and last year were able to moon-bounce on Herb Jeffrey's Rentable Moon Bounces. One mother would provide her children with five dollars and enjoyed watching them make

their purchases. Authors have signed and sold their books at the markets, enriching our lives with a broader

It has become apparent that the market at its current location has reached a growth ceiling. Therefore effectively on April 19, after the closing of the Easter market at 12 noon, the Farmers' Market at Elverson will close its doors, but not their collective businesses. ## WEST VIRGINIA TRAINS, SHOWS & FOLIAGE

Please consider joining Jody and Friends on a deluxe motor coach trip this October to the mountains of West Virginia to ride four historic excursion railroads, be entertained at four musical variety shows and stay for four nights at first class motels. Everyone's favorite travel guide Julie Setzer will escort our group on this exciting

five-day, four-night adventure on **October 8-12**, **2014** with a guaranteed pick-up at the Morgantown McDonalds.

Our first stop is in Winchester, Virginia, where we have the opportunity to explore the Patsy Cline Visitor's Center and her historic home. A driving tour through her hometown takes us past the drug store where she worked, her gravesite and more. Dinner at Granny's, featuring traditional southern cooking, is followed by a tribute singer crooning some of Patsy's signature songs.

The next morning, we begin the rail travel portion of our trip with a three-hour ride aboard the Potomac Eagle Scenic Railroad through the rugged Blue Ridge Mountains. We spend this afternoon exploring the town of Elkins, where we spend the night and the next two nights at Holiday Inn Express.

On Day three, we enjoy a tour of the Green Bank Radio Observatory followed by a ride on the Cass Scenic Railroad. This historic timber train steams to the town of Cass where we can explore this historic logging settlement. This evening we can relax with a great meal and lively variety show.

The fourth day of the trip includes two train rides – one on the Cheat Mountain Salamander, which features lunch on board and a stop to enjoy a lovely waterfall, and the second on the coal-fired Durbin Rocket, which takes us on a ten and a half mile ride through the Monongahela National Forest. Day four begins and ends with a music show and our final dinner is served in a Timber Baron's Mansion. The last show is billed as a two-hour variety show featuring "country, gospel, pop and patriotic tunes blended together with a little homespun humor."

On our last day we stop on the way home at Power Husky Dogsled Racing, to learn about this unique sport before continuing back to PA.

This trip includes ten meals – four hot breakfasts, three dinners and three lunches aboard the trains. It is fully escorted and all taxes and tips are included except a discretionary gratuity for the Tour Guide and Bus Driver. You may leave your car at McDonald's while you are gone.
