THE BLIZZARD OF 1996

ith the 20th anniversary of the Blizzard of 1996 today and tomor-

row, I retrieved my personal photograph of the impact of the storm at my Summerfield home on 8 Stable Drive in Elverson, PA. I took this photo on 35 mm film on January 8, 1996, which was "the day after" when Chester County residents were digging out from the blizzard. The storm started here on January 7, 1996, and continued all night and into the next day, January 8, before moving north and northeast from here.

As snowplows came to begin their enormous effort on the streets and driveways, I rallied up some energy and cleared my house front sidewalk with a conventional snow shovel. It required a strenuous effort, of course! As I threw each shovel load upward

to either side of the path, the snow piles on top of the accumulated snowfall itself became higher and

> higher. The snow pile on the right exceeds the height of the front porch roof (which is over 8 feet high) by about a foot. You can see the numeral 8 on my front door in this photograph....and Christmas lights aglow!

It was a remarkable experience as my Summerfield / Elverson Borough neighbors and I labored to get paths from our front doors cleared. I also remember a wonderful sense of community as we helped elderly neighbors in getting a path cleared to their doors and checking with them to see if they were safe and warm.


The Blizzard of 1996 was a severe nor'easter that paralyzed the U.S. East

Coast with up to 4 feet of wind-driven snow from January 6 to January 8, 1996. It was followed by another storm, an Alberta Clipper, on January 12, then unusually warm weather and torrential rain which caused rapid melting and river flooding.

teel beams framing the new building of the Community Evangelical Free Church (CEFC) on Brick Lane in Elverson have been installed. After months of site preparation work, major excavation and building concrete block towers for stairs and an elevator, the

structure of the new building is beginning to take shape. Now, with the steel beams in place, the shape of the building can be seen. The archi-

WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IS IT?

ater affects nearly every aspect of our lives. Every business, large and small, depends on it. Every family uses it and expects it to be safe, drinkable and always available. We expect to quickly and easily rid ourselves of waste water and we don't expect to be flooded out by storms.

Each year the American Society of Civil Engineers provides a report card for America's water infrastructure. Pennsylvania received a "D" based largely on the physical condition of the state's water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure coupled with the lack of capital reserve funding set aside by municipalities, authorities and

private water companies to repair and/ or replace this infrastructure.

Elverson Borough is not exempt from this aging infrastructure. The Main Street Water Main was installed 60 years ago. The majority of the Sewer Collection System is almost 30 years old. And we have barely begun to form policy and regulate storm water. We cannot expect these systems

to eternally function and ignore replacement plans. Besides, these replacement plans will require a capital reserve and coupled with means to fund them.

Beyond water and wastewater, Elverson has storm-water

systems. The future needs for best management practices for storm-water management to comply with state (DEP) and federal (EPA) requirements are beyond the current funding resources of our Borough. Whether Pennsylvania municipalities and the state will come together to address the storm-water issues remains to be seen.

Since our expected quality of life depends on these systems, failure is not an option. If we expect our services to continue eternally without thought and resources, we live in denial. So, whose responsibility is it? Public infrastructure is for the convenience of the public. The burden lays on all of our shoulders.

We need to understand the current age of the infrastructure we inherited from our forefathers and understand the need for a replacement plan. The need for and value of adequate systems are critical to our community and way of life. A visit to a third world country will underline this fact.

LOCAL TAX RETURN IS DUE APRIL 18

It's that time of year again. The 2015 local earned income tax return filing deadline is approaching. The due date is extended to Monday April 18 this year because Washington DC is commemorating Emancipation Day on Friday April 15.

Did you know the quickest way to get your refund is to file online? If you live and work in Pennsylvania, you can e-file on our tax administrator's secure website, which is available 24/7 at www.KeystoneCollects.com.

Keystone Collections Group's e-file is the easy, fast and secure way to file your 2015 tax return. It lets you file your tax return when it is most convenient for you. You will need your W-2, your Social Security Number and any other income documents that may apply (such as a PA-UE or a Schedule C).

Keystone redesigned e-file to make it even faster and more userfriendly.

knowledgeable Taxpayer Service Agent. You can also email your questions 24/7 to Taxpayer Support. Taxpayer Service Agents try to respond to all online inquiries within three business days.

Taxpayers with earned income in 2015 are required to file a Final Tax Return by Monday, April 18.



ELVERSON NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH HOME SMOKE DETECTORS ALERT

his is to advise you of some very important information that I found out for those who live in Summerfield, Parkside and anyone who lives in the Elverson Borough and have direct wired (hard wired) smoke detectors, which were probably installed when your home was built. THE IMPORTANT INFORMATION IS THAT YOUR CURRENT SMOKE ALARM WILL PROBABLY NOT WORK AND MUST BE REPLACED.

If your smoke detector is like the ones installed in my home, (which is now about 17 years old), it is a smoke detector manufactured by the Maple Chase Company, and is model # G-6. The Maple Chase Company is no longer in business and was bought out by Kidde Company. Kidde sell through the company direct (www.shopkidde.com) or through Home Depot.

The original smoke detectors were guaranteed for 5 years. In talking to the Kidde Company I found out that the maximum life for a smoke detector is between 8 and 10 years. There are national fire codes that require the smoke detectors to be replaced in 10 years.

How old is your home? Also, if you push the Test button and it makes the alarm sound, that alone does not mean the smoke detector is working and that it probably is only indicates that it has electric connected and does not indicate it will sense a fire/smoke.

One problem with the current installed smoke detector G -6 is that it has a connector that will not connect with the new smoke detectors sold by Kidde or other manufactures. They advise that a licensed electrician install your new detector. They also recommend detectors with a battery back-up, in case you have lost the electric.

How Well Do You Know Elverson Borough?

ongratulations to John Mohl, who knew that the red painted bluebird house pictured in the last issue of the "Elverson Borough Newsletter" is located on the north (cemetery) side of the Warwick Bible Church on the inside of the bend in South Chestnut Street. He also volunteered that it was placed there by Lois Shank, a former Elverson resident, who has moved to a warmer climate.

The Warwick Bible Church was constructed as the United Brethren Church in 1883-1884 for a sum of "upwards of \$2500." The land for the church was donated by a very generous Springfield resident, Mr. Christian Kurtz, who also donated the land for the adjoining cemetery and the iron fence surrounding it. Kurtz chose the first burial lot in the cemetery, and is buried in the large monument in its center. Six independent congregations have worshipped in the church since 1959, five of which moved to larger facilities. The Warwick Bible Church has held services there since 1987. Originally the front entrance extended upwards to include a bell tower, but the tower was struck by lightning and destroyed and was never replaced.



This month's photo is of an historic Elverson building. Please tell me the address of this old farmhouse, which can be seen from the road. As always, be careful if you drive around the Borough looking for this house as I suspect there will be snow alongside the roads very soon.
