HISTORICAL COMMISSION OPEN HOUSE

he Open House for the newly remodeled school room at Borough Hall, sponsored by the Elverson Historical Commission on June 24, was declared a success by EHC members Cookie Onushko, Rose Stroker and myself, as about 25 people strolled around the room examining exhibits and displays illustrating Elverson historic memorabilia. Now named Mrs. McElroy's Room, after the teacher who taught grades 5-8 in the room for 43 years (from 1924-1967 when the school closed), this north classroom had fallen into disrepair over the years and was unsuitable for storing Elverson's treasures. With money from a grant, it was repaired and redecorated. Locking display cases were recently purchased and residents began donating items so that all Elversonians could appreciate our Borough's rich history

The colorful mural painted by Kathryn Winn drew everyone's attention as they entered the room, as did two large photo collages featuring students in both Miss Dunlap's and Mrs. McElroy's classes in the early to mid 20th century. Several visitors recognized classmates in the many pictures, which Cookie has lovingly and accurately annotated and preserved over the years. One lady recalled that students used to play Jacks on the wide windowsills. Another recalled a clock which hung on the wall at the entrance to the room. Under it Mrs. McElroy had posted a sign which read, "Time passes. Will you?" Several wondered when the next Open House would be held so that they could bring their friends and neighbors to see the artifacts.

The Elverson Historical Commission plans to host another Open House and a speaker in the fall, hopefully to talk about the history of the Wilmington and Northern Railroad that used to run through





Elverson. Next March or April, we hope to stage a play in the new room. Elverson Boy Scout Troop 37 meets in the room on a weekly basis and other organized groups are invited to use the classroom for meetings and presentations. New acquisitions are always welcome. "The History of our Community: Elverson Pennsylvania" is still for sale for \$15 by contacting any Commission member or by visiting Borough Hall during its regular hours, Monday through Thursday from 9 am to 3 pm. 
