We're All in this Together


ur Main Street construction has begun. The general scope of the project is the complete replacement of the roadway pavement and subsurface, new concrete curbs, ADA ramps and replacement of damaged and corrugated metal drainage pipe. We are in phase 1A. Each phase is described below with scheduled completion in October 2019.

ANCHORED BY GRACE MOVES TO ELVERSON

This past July 4th was a hot one. Instead of swimming and playing family games, we were moving shelving units, boxes, bags, and tables into the old church formerly known as Warwick Bible Church.

Who are "we", you ask? "We" are Ian and Erika Kanter and we have the honor of running a ministry called Anchored by Grace. Anchored by Grace Ministry, a ministry of Morgantown Community Church, started in July 2016 as a one time clothing drive for Back to School that grew into something so much bigger. We provide basic necessities, such as clothing and toiletries, to the local people in need. We accept donations of clothing, shoes, accessories, and toiletries in good, clean condition. Our team sorts through each donated item and preps them to be hung in the mobile clothing closet, a 16 ft. enclosed trailer. Unlike Goodwill or a regular clothing bank, we are exclusively mobile. The mobile clothing closet visits various areas in need, where people can shop through the trailer for free. There are no income reguirements and a "no questions asked" policy. Anchored by Grace Mobile Clothing Closet parks in Reading twice a month in addition to regularly scheduled outreaches, various drives (back to school, winter coats, etc.), as well as assisting the code blue shelters with needed items.

In addition to taking the trailer, we are also available to help any local family that has a need we can fulfill. Donations can be dropped off in the Anchored barrels in each vestibule at Morgantown Community Church, located at 4221 Main St. Elverson. Mosquitos Abound!!

This year is proving to be a difficult year for mosquitos all throughout the County.

Many considered 2012 to be the worse year historically for mosquito-borne diseases. Unfortunately in Chester County and Pennsylvania, 2018 is fast approaching, and in some cases, already surpassed the numbers we saw in 2012!

As you likely know, the Chester County Health Department has a Mosquito-Borne Diseases program which involves education, surveillance and control efforts. A critical element of our surveillance includes collecting mosquito samples using traps that aid in monitoring the mosquito population's rate of infection diseases such as West Nile Virus (WNV) and Zika which is spread to people by mosquito bites.

Spotted Lanternfly (SLF)

Spotted Lanternfly is active in our area. Reporting SLF is no longer necessary but the PA Department of Agriculture would like you to report destroying egg masses. The real question is, "How do we get rid of this pest?"


The department's recommended technique for controlling spotted lanternfly is host tree removal and trap tree establishment. Not exactly the speedy solution we had in mind but this is not a sprint. The host tree is Tree of Heaven, Ailanthus altissima. If you have this on your property, consider removing it.

There is no insecticide labeled to control spotted lanternfly but you may use insecticides labeled for ornamental plants as long as the plant that you want to spray is listed on the label. The two insecticide types that are being used most frequently have either neonicotinoid or imidacloprid as the active ingredient. I am not a fan of neonicotinoid insecticides due to the fact that they have been linked to colony collapse in bee hives. Some scientists dispute this but in my opinion if there is alternative that won't hurt the bees why not use it. As you can see, I advocate an Integrated Pest Management approach.

The key to control is to treat the insect when it is at the most vulnerable time in its life cycle. The spotted lanternfly has a one year life cycle; egg, nymphs (4 instar stages), adult. The egg and first two instar stages are the most vulnerable time for SLF. In winter look for egg masses on smooth surfaces and scrape them off into containers with hand sanitizer or rubbing alcohol. To control instars, band the tree. This is an adhesive wrap that goes around the tree trunk to catch the insects as they walk up and down the tree. In case you are wondering the SLF is in its fourth instar/adult stage.


