#### **Container Gardening**

he weather has been a roller coaster but it looks like warmer weather is here to stay, finally. Now we can add those splashes of color to our garden and containers without fear of losing plants to freezes or frost. Annuals add consistent color to the garden all summer and into the fall. Using them in containers is one of the easiest ways to

add that pop and sizzle around your home and garden.

Larger, heavier containers should be filled and planted where they will be displayed. There's no sense in creating more work for yourself trying to move a large container after it is planted. Pro Tip: Use Styrofoam or other lightweight material to fill the bottom third to half of your large container. This reduces the amount of potting soil that you will need.

Annuals used in containers may be described as

thrillers, fillers and spillers. The thrillers are the taller plants exploding out of the center. Thrillers are the star. The spillers are the trailing plants cascading down the sides. The fillers are the plants tying the thrillers and spillers together.

Thrillers are the centerpiece and good thrillers include

upright plants like Cannas, umbrella plants like Elephant Ears and ornamental grasses like Fountain Grass. Fillers add mass while hiding the base of the thriller. Fillers also add texture and color to the overall scheme. Spillers soften your container and complete the planting. Spillers may compliment or contrast the other plants.

Containers give you the chance to express yourself through plants. Visit your local garden center and gather thrillers, fillers and spill-

ers that you find appealing. Play with color and texture and see what works for you. Have fun. It's what playing in the dirt is all about.

Also, planning for reopening the church has begun. A task force is researching and strategizing how and when we can gather again for worship, with a desire to honor God, one another, and our neighbors.



## FRENCH CREEK GOLF CLUB – EMBRACING OUR COMMUNITY

n March 15, 2020, the state of Pennsylvania mandated that many businesses close their doors to limit the spread of COVID-19. French Creek Golf Club (FCGC) abided by the state mandate. Like many seasonal businesses, FCGC was getting ready for both the golf and event season. Many golf tournaments, weddings, and graduation parties take place April-June. FCGC will not have any events during this period. However, FCGC has continued to employ all full-time employees at their regular pay and kept all benefits in place. This represents 90% of the total payroll and related costs. Grass does not know there is a pandemic and continues to grow. Some full-time clubhouse employees moved to the grounds maintenance department during this time.

On April 30, FCGC started take out service and on May 1, the state allowed limited golf play. To help their neighbors, FCGC is now offering take-out service for non- members. Residents can visit www.frenchcreekgolf.com for the menu and ordering instructions. Take out service is available Thursday-Sunday starting at 2pm.

Additionally, starting June 2, French Creek Golf Club will allow those on the front lines who have sacrificed so much to play the course for free. The program is called "Heroes on the Green" and will be available for four players each day Tuesday-Thursday. Hospital, police, fire, and EMT professionals can call the pro shop to arrange to play, 610-913-6330 ext 103.

In these difficult and challenging times, French Creek Golf Club is working to make life a little easier for its neighbors and to reward front line professionals.
